

- Students must pass all MCAS Testing Requirements.

- Starting with the Class of 2026 ELA and Math 486 and above (or 470-485 must fulfill the requirements of an Educational Proficiency Plan or EPP).
- CLass of 2026 MCAS Science is 470 or higher
- Students must complete 40 Total Hours of <u>Community Service</u>.

GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT

It is the mission of the PVMHS Guidance Department to assist students in acquiring social, personal, educational, and career development skills necessary for living in a multicultural, technologically sophisticated, and rapidly changing society. Counselors strive to impart in each student a sense of self-worth, independence, sound decision making skills, and a desire for lifelong learning. The department's focus is the implementation of a developmental guidance program.

Responsible Course Selection:

The importance of choosing your courses well cannot be overemphasized. On the basis of your choices, a master schedule is created to accommodate your selections. In this sense *you* are building the master schedule. Once a student has selected courses for the next year and is scheduled into those courses, there will be no request for change in September unless unusual circumstances exist. A request for a course change may often not be possible because courses may already be at the maximum number. Therefore, course selections must be made carefully and wisely, based on your educational needs and abilities. Students should discuss their course selections with their caregivers, counselors, and teachers before making a decision. Level changes are allowed up until the end of semester 1.

Recommended Entrance Requirements for Institutions of Higher Learning: Admissions to Highly Selective Colleges:

4 years - English
4 years - Math
4 years - Science
4 years - Social Studies
3-4 years - World Languages (consecutive)

Students who plan to attend colleges with highly competitive admissions standards should select the most competitive and demanding courses available at PVMHS. Honors and Advanced Placement courses are highly desirable for those students who are capable of handling the demanding pace.

Admission to Massachusetts State Universities and Selective Colleges: **REQUIREMENTS**

- 4 years English
- 4 years Mathematics (Algebra 1, Geometry, Algebra 2)
- 3 years Sciences (including two with laboratory work)
- 3 years Social Sciences (including one in US History)
- 2 years World Languages (in the same language)

Elective courses - 2 of which are recommended to be from the Arts, Humanities or Technology

Admissions to Two Year Colleges and Community Colleges (associate degree):

Requirements generally follow those listed for four-year colleges since transfer is made to the third year of a four-year college, where a major is selected for the final two years.

Admissions to One and Two Year Colleges and Community Colleges (certificate programs):

Requirements for certificate programs (not for transfer) depend upon the policies of the individual colleges. High school courses that include some college preparatory areas are desired.

EXPLANATION OF LEVELS

At all levels, the standards mandated by the curriculum frameworks and Common Core of Learning is the guidelines for curriculum development. Subjects will be weighted based on their levels and weighted grade point averages will be used for rank in class and honors.

AP Level These subjects follow the <u>ADVANCED PLACEMENT</u> Curriculum developed by

Educational Testing Services. It is recommended that students take no more than

3 AP classes at a time.

Honors Subjects are accelerated in nature and students are selected on the basis of

demonstrated superior achievement. This level endeavors, through a most rigorous and demanding discipline, to meet the needs of those who are highly

motivated. Extensive work outside the classroom is required.

College Prep Subjects at this level are intensive, rigorous, and challenging. Work outside the

classroom is expected.

Unleveled/Graded These courses are graded but not leveled. The grading for these course(s) will

not be figured in the student's rank in class. The quarterly grade reflects class

work as well as work assigned outside of class.

GPA/Class Rank Outside Courses/Dual Enrollment: These courses are not factored into GPA or

class rank.

Transfer Students: Must be registered as a full time student by September of

their Junior year in order to receive a class rank.

SPECIAL EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

The Special Education Department of Peabody Veterans Memorial High School provides a continuum of educational services for students identified through M.G.L.c. 71(b) and 603 CMR 28.00 regulations, the regulatory guidelines of the IDEA Act, and all of the revisions of the Every Student Succeeds Act. The department consists of a Team Chairperson, a Department Head, a school psychologist, certified special needs teachers (with strong content knowledge), paraprofessionals (80% college degrees), special needs counselors, and speech and language pathologist. Other services such as physical and occupational therapy, adaptive wellness (physical education & health), specialized reading instruction, and hearing and vision-impaired services that are provided as identified in a student's IEP.

PVMHS offers a wide variety of opportunities for students to develop and reach their educational and vocational/career goals. Through the TEAM process, an Individualized Education Plan is developed to meet all the needs and interests of our Special Needs Students in the least restrictive environment in order to help them transition from school to life after high school.

PVMHS offers the following programs to students identified as in need of special services:

Learning Center (LLRS):

(Unleveled, pass/fail grade, one semester (2.5 credits) or full year (5 credits), 5 periods per week, grades 9-12). Students who are identified as in need of a Learning Center for Language, Learning, and Reading Services in order to develop skills as per their IEP goals. These skills are developed through their content support work and/or teacher/specialist generated work. The Learning Center also works with students on self-advocacy.

Inclusion Classes:

PVMHS is an inclusive educational site, which supports all students in the classroom through systematic collaborative efforts. Inclusion classes are either taught by the general education teacher or by the general education teacher with support from a member of the special education department. All inclusion classes are made up of special needs and general education students. These classes provide differentiated instruction, curriculum, and assessment. All staff understand the citywide District City Accommodation Plan (DCAP). The general education staff makes accommodations according to the student's Individualized Education Plan.

Self-Contained Classes:

(College Prep, graded, full year, 5 periods, 5 credits, grades 9-12)

PVMHS provides courses that are in alignment with the curriculum framework standards, and follow the high school curriculum when applicable. Instruction, curriculum, and assessment are modified to meet the individual student's needs according to their IEP. All courses are engaging and challenge the learner to exceed their present level of competency without discouraging them. All classes formulate some essential questions, which are simple questions about big ideas, have objectives which describe measurable outcomes, and use rubrics to help measure outcomes. The John Collins Writing Program is used across the curriculum. All classes integrate specific strategies to help student performance on the MCAS. It is our objective to give students skills in order to pass the statewide assessment testing either by passing the general MCAS test with or without accommodations, or the Alternative Assessment MCAS exam (IEP determined). Courses offered are: Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II, Coordinated Math, U.S. History I, U.S. History II, World History, Biology, Chemistry, and English 9-10-11-12

Transition Skills (LLRS)

(Unleveled, graded, full year, 5 periods, 5 credits, grades 9-12)

This class has five major components: academic, vocational, social, life skills and community awareness. Academic and vocational experiences are tailored to meet the needs of the individual student. Life skills and community awareness focus on increasing students' independence. Students receive additional support services as specified in their Individual Education Plans.

The ACCESS Program (Accelerating Career, Community and Educational Student Success)

(Unleveled, graded, full year, 5 periods, 5 credits, grades 9-12)

The High School ACCESS program of the Peabody Public Schools works with special needs students grades 9-12 to prepare them for a successful transition into adulthood. Students in the ACCESS program begin at the Peabody Veterans Memorial High School with a curriculum that aligns with the Massachusetts Frameworks with a strong focus on life skills. Students also participate in mainstream electives with a focus on academic and vocational skill building. All students in the program receive vocational skills assessments, introduction to travel training, and social skills education. Trained staff will conduct formal and informal assessments that facilitate job readiness which match student's interest and abilities.

Included in the ACCESS program is a School-to-Work component which provides students with the training necessary to function independently in the community and work environment. A School to Work Transition Coordinator develops school based and community based internships and/or competitive employment vocational experiences for all students. The Coordinator pairs job coaches and students with appropriate work sites to train and supervise a student's on site work experience. The on site training hours are determined by each student's Individual Educational Program.

Post-High School Program

Students transition to the Milestones Post-High School program after graduating from Peabody Veterans Memorial High School and receiving their Certificate of Achievement. The program addresses occupational development and the acquisition of independent living skills necessary to become more productive members of the community. Through a partnership with the Northshore Education Consortium, students attend the Embark program at Salem State University two days a week. At Embark the students address functional academics as well as personal and social growth goals. The other three days the students participate in various Community Service Learning activities, vocational internships, competitive community employment and independent living and consumer skills training. The goals of these activities include developing marketable job skills, demonstrating positive work behaviors, practicing appropriate social skills and community orientation.

SCHOOL PROGRAMS

Career and Technical Education (CTE) - The Career and Technical Education programs at Peabody Veterans Memorial High School offer a four-year, sequential course of study in a variety of technical areas. These programs are Massachusetts DESE Chapter 74 - approved and offer career pathways for all students, college bound and career bound. CTE students learn about college and career opportunities through career assessments, research, planning, and direct experience in career projects. These projects make connections between school and the skills and competencies required in the career marketplace of the 21st century. Each program provides students with the skills, confidence, educational credentials and motivation needed to help them succeed in their chosen educational or career pathway. All CTE programs follow the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education Vocational Technical Education Frameworks. When programs are oversubscribed, students will be admitted based upon the process outlined in the CTE admissions policy.

Community School Program - The Peabody Community School Program is a sub-separate special education program within PVMHS, for a student whose primary disability is social/emotional. The Community School follows the PVMHS curriculum and strives to reach and challenge all students through diverse teaching techniques incorporating differentiated instruction and project based learning. The school also serves students who may have secondary disabilities in the area of learning, communication, sensory and/or health. The school fulfills the PVMHS graduation requirements and students are eligible to receive a diploma.

Peabody Learning Academy - The Peabody Learning Academy serves the grade 9- 12 student population of Peabody Veterans Memorial High School (PVMHS). In partnership with the Simon Youth Foundation, it is part of the Peabody Public School District and is located at the Northshore Mall. Recognized nationally as one of the most successful, non-traditional high school programs in the United States, this program allows students to learn in an alternative setting with the use of the traditional and digital learning platforms and for many, to participate in PVMHS after school and club activities.

CARES Program - The Peabody CARES Program, in collaboration with Peabody Veterans Memorial High School and the Peabody Community High School, provides additional support to students returning to school from long term absences (mental-health hospitalizations, medical issues, concussions, etc.) following the BRYT model. CARES represents the core values of the program, Community, Academic Reentry, and Emotional Support. The Peabody CARES Program is a Tier III RTI program open to students who are in need of additional support returning to school following extended mental health or medically involved absences. Students can be referred to the program by guidance, administration, counseling staff, teachers or families. Individual re-entry plans are created by CARES staff members to assist students in returning to school and follow a 4-step plan for full academic re-entry while providing emotional and social support throughout the process. Students in the CARES program usually participate for a short period of time, usually 3 - 6 weeks, but individual needs vary and students' full return to school is monitored throughout the program.





The Course Selection Chart below is designed to assist students and parents in selecting one or more courses that align with the **AFJROTC** Department. The chart represents your choice of electives in the AFJROTC Department by year and level. Students are required to meet MINIMUM Air Force JROTC standards, including uniform wear once per week and grooming standards to remain in the program. **Any high school student in any year of study can enroll in Air Force JROTC.** Further information is available with your Guidance Counselor. Courses that grant 5 credits run for the **full year**, and courses that grant 2.5 credits run for **one semester**.

AIR FORCE JROTC

Additional Requirements: Aerospace Science, Leadership Education and Wellness are included in all AFJROTC courses. Instructors have developed a 7 year Curriculum Plan that outlines the courses being taught each year, so a student does not repeat any course. The sequence of courses may change in order to make sure no course is repeated. **Participation in Air Force JROTC (for an entire year) courses fulfills requirements for Wellness**

Career and Technical Certification:

Upon the completion of their course of study, students will attain a High School Diploma and a Certificate of Occupational Proficiency, along with industry-recognized credentials relevant to their chosen field. This achievement not only validates their proficiency in the selected career pathway but also provides a solid foundation to bridge the gap between industry and career, ensuring readiness for successful entry and advancement postsecondary and professional.

Admission Process:

 When programs are oversubscribed, admissions will follow the process outlined in the <u>CTE admissions</u> <u>policy</u>, ensuring fair and transparent selection.

Academic Requirements:

CTE students are required to complete 20
 English credits, 15 Math credits, 15 Social
 Studies credits, 10 Science credits, and 7.5
 Wellness credits, ensuring a well-rounded education that complements their technical skills. It's important to note that students with significant absences, including suspensions, may risk not meeting the necessary instructional hours for eligibility.


